

RECOMMENDATIONS.

From EMMA WILLARD, former Principal and Founder of the Troy Female Seminary, and author of several valuable works on Geography, History, &c.

Having examined McCLEARY & PIERCE'S Dissected Map of the State of New York, I cheerfully recommend its use as an excellent method of learning the comparative size and location of the counties. An amusing game may easily be made of the pieces, as I found by trial. Having two little girls to play it under my direction, I took 20 as the number, which, the first to obtain, was winner. Then putting the pieces on the table, inverted and without order, each of the parties chose, in turn, a piece and placed their finger on the frame which she was going to put it; if she chose the right piece for the place, then she had one set down towards the game; if wrong, nothing; if she told the name of the piece before looking at its face, she might be entitled to two, and so on. The little girls said they should study the map well before they played the game again. This good resolution shows the usefulness of such a game in keeping up a lively attention; and attention is the sure precursor of memory. Older persons, as well as children, might in this way amuse themselves, at least for a time, very profitably.
