Any Number of Persons can Play.
—♦♦—

- 1.—Select one to act as Preceptor, and hold the Book of Answers. The rest of the players are called Scholars.
- 2.—The Preceptor mixes the cards, and gives at least six to each player, who places them before him on the table, face downwards.
- 3.—The Preceptor then asks the Scholar on his left to turn up a card, and read aloud the question it contains.
- 4.—If the one turning up the card cannot answer its question, he passes it to the Scholar on his left, who, upon failure to answer it, also passes it to the one on his left, and so on around, until it arrives at the Preceptor. The Preceptor then

- reads its answer from the book, that all may know it in future.
- 5.—If any Scholar answers the question, he is entitled to the card and lays it aside for game.
 - 6.—The Preceptor then asks the next, or second Scholar on the left, to turn up a card, which is read and disposed of the same as the previous one.
 - 7.—Each Scholar must, in turn, be given a chance to answer all questions passed around, before they are returned to the Preceptor.
 - 8.—Immediately after a question is answered, the next player on the left of the one who last turned up, must turn up a card, and read its question.
 - 9.—No Scholar can answer a question out of turn. If he does so, the card will be won by the Scholar who at that moment held it.
 - 10.—When all the cards given out have been turned up, the Scholar who has answered the greatest number of questions (decided by counting the cards laid aside) wins the game.

No. 11. King of Salem, the priest of God, who blessed Abram.—*Gen. 14 : 18-20.*

No. 12. The maid of Sarai, Abram's wife, an Egyptian. Hagar was afterward a wife to Abram.—*Gen. 16 : 1, 2, 3.*

No. 13. Son of Zohar, the Hittite, of whom Abraham bought his burial place.—*Gen. 23 : 10-17.*

No. 14. Son of Abram and Hagar.—*Gen. 16 : 16.*

No. 15. The woman who saved the two spies which Joshua sent to spy around Jericho.—*Joshua, 2 : 1-21.*

No. 16. A Jew, the son of Jair, cousin to Queen Esther.—*Esther, 2 : 5-7.*

No. 17. Esther was the choice of

King Ahasuerus, among many maidens; therefore he made her his queen.—*Esther, 2 : 8-18.*

No. 18. Haman was next to King Ahasuerus in authority. He conspired to hang Mordecai, Queen Esther's cousin; but failing, was hung himself.—*Esther, 3 : 1, 2.*

No. 19. Nine hundred and sixty-nine years.—*Gen. 5 : 27.*

No. 20. The wife of King Ahasuerus.—*Esther, 2 : 16, 17.*

No. 21. Jacob's uncle.—*Gen. 28 : 1, 2.*

No. 22. Son of Carmi, who appropriated to himself some of the spoils of Jericho. Joshua caused him, and his sons, and his daughters, and his oxen to be put to death; after which, with all his goods, they were burned.—*Joshua, 7 : 17-26.*

No. 23. Laban's daughters, Jacob's cousins, who became his wives.—*Gen. 29 : 16-28.*

No. 24. The captain of the chil-

dren of Zebulun, who numbered 57,400.—*Num. 2: 7, 8.*

No. 25. Solomon.—*1 Kings, 3: 6-12.*

No. 26. Wife of King Ahab, of Samaria, a very wicked woman.—*1 Kings, 21: 4, 5.* For a full history of this bad woman, read *1 Kings, chaps. 21 and 22*; also, *2 Kings, chap. 9.*

No. 27. Naboth, a Jezreelite. King Ahab coveted his vineyard, and wanted to buy it; but Naboth would not part with it. Wicked Jezebel, by a plot, caused him to be put to death, so that her husband, the king, might be gratified.—*1 Kings, 21: 1-16.*

No. 28. One of the kings of Israel, whom the Prophet Elisha anointed. His mission was to destroy the house of Ahab and wicked Jezebel.—*2 Kings, 9: 1-6.*

No. 29. Jesse.—*1 Sam. 16: 19.*

No. 30. Zelophehad, son of He-

pher. It was when the children of Israel were in the wilderness.—*Num. 15: 32-36*; and *Num. 27: 1-3.*

No. 31. Wife of Moses.—*Exod. 18: 2.*

No. 32. Son of Moses.—*Exod. 18: 2, 3.*

No. 33. Father-in-law of Moses.—*Exod. 18: 1.*

No. 34. A prophetess, wife of Lapidoth. She judged Israel.—*Judges, 4: 4.*

No. 35. Samson.—*Judges, chaps. 14, 15, 16.*

No. 36. They are the leaders of a rebellion against Moses in the wilderness. The earth opened and swallowed them.—*Num. chap. 16.*

No. 37. Servant to Elisha.—*2 Kings, 5: 20.*

No. 38. Captain of the armies of the king of Syria, whom Elisha cured of leprosy.—*2 Kings, chap. 5.*

No. 39. The captain of the army of Jabin, king of Canaan, whom Jael

killed by driving a nail into his head while he was asleep.—*Judges, 4 : 2-21.*

No. 40. Wife of Heber, the Kenite, who killed Sisera, the captain of the host of King Jabin.—*Judges, 1 : 17-21.*

No. 41. One of the heads of the children of Israel, whom Moses sent to search the promised land of Canaan; the son of Jephunneh.—*Num. 13 : 1-6.*

No. 42. He whom Judah and Simeon slew in Bezek, having first cut off his thumbs and great toes; he having boasted that he had done the same to seventy kings.—*Judges, 1 : 1-7.*

No. 43. Shamgar, the son of Anath.—*Judges, 3 : 31.*

No. 44. Jephthah vowed a vow unto the Lord that if he delivered the children of Ammon into his (Jephthah's) hands, on his return home whoever or whatever met him at his

door, he would offer up as a burnt offering to the Lord. His daughter met him, and he kept his vow—offered her as a burnt offering, or burned her up.—*Judges, 11 : 30-40.*

No. 46. Hannah, wife of Elkanah.—*1 Sam. 1 : 19, 20.*

No. 48. Son of Kish, anointed by Samuel as king of Israel.—*1 Sam. chap. 10.*

No. 49. Son of Abiel, a Benjamite, a mighty man.—*1 Sam. 9 : 1.*

No. 50. Goliath, of Gath.—*1 Sam. 17 : 4.*

No. 51. David, with a sling.—*1 Sam. 17 : 49, 50.*

No. 52. Elijah.—*1 Kings, 17 : 1-6.*

No. 53. Son of Saul.—*1 Sam. 14 : 1.*

No. 54. The son of a widow woman, to whom God sent Elijah to dwell.—*1 Kings, 17: 9-24.*
