THE IMPROVED GAME

WHAT D'YE BUY.

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This very lively and amusing game is played with a set of twelve large picture cards (called Trade Cards) each of which represents some branch of trade—as a Music Store, Dry Goods Store, Grocery Store, &c., &c. Accompanying each of the Trade Cards are six smaller cards, having names of different articles sold by that trade.

There is also a story, which is a very prominent feature of the game. This must be read aloud by one of the players, who shall have been appointed as leader. In the story are many sudden pauses, indicated by dashes, and at these points in reading the leader must suddenly stop and look directly into the face of one of the players, when such player must at once and promptly read the top card in his or her

hand. (See directions.) The curious and haphazard combinations made by the story and the reading from the small cards is productive of a vast amount of amusement.

DIRECTIONS.

The game may be player by from three to thirteen persons.

First.—Choose a leader who shall distribute the cards among the different players, giving to each a "Trade Card" and the six small cards accompanying the Trade Card. If a small number of players two or more Trade Cards and accompanying small cards can be given to each player.

Second — Each player will lay his Trade Card upon the table before him, face up, so that the leader may readily see it.

Third.—All the small cards held by each player must be placed upon the table in a pile, all face down, and should a player represent more than one trade the small cards of all trades represented by such

player can be placed in one pile, but should first be well shuffled or mixed together

Fourth.—The leader then reads the story, clearly and distinctly, pausing at each dash, and looking intently at one of the players, who must very quickly turn over the top card in his small cards and read aloud the name or article represented on that card. The leader then continues his story until another dash is reached and another small card turned and read by the player appealed to, and so the game continues until the story is finished.

IT IS ALL IMPORTANT that the responses from the different players appealed to by the sudden glance from the leader should be VERY PROMPT, and forfeits may be made in discretion of leader if any player is not wide awake in responding.

The leader may "look" at the players in regular order or "here and there" as he may prefer.
