OF \$1,000,000. To win the game a Brewster must spend his \$1,000,000
THE GAME with the aid of his Stooges. The Stooges are placed on the board as directed by the spin of the Rainbow Wheel and Diary Chart. The more Stooges a player has, the faster his fortune is spent, because each Stooge is paid wages and all payments to the banker are multiplied by the number of Stooges a Brewster has.

IMPLEMENTS—60 Octagonal pieces called STOOGES—15 each of four colors. 60 Pieces with knobs called SUPER-STOOGES—15 each of four colors. The Wheel Card having the RAINBOW and DIARY WHEELS. \$4,000,000 in Brewster Money. Special Spending Board. The game is for two to eight players. (See special instructions for five to eight player game.)

DIRECTIONS

This game is easily learned by following these directions step by step.

First one player is selected to be the Banker. He gives each player \$1,000,000, divided as follows:—

30 \$20,000 bills—\$600,000

30 \$10,000 bills—\$300,000

20 \$ 5,000 bills-\$100,000

15 Stooges all of the same color

15 Super-Stooges all of the same color

BANKER Receives money paid by each Brewster and pays money as Diary Cards direct. This money is kept separate from his own playing money. He has nothing to do with money paid between players.

All players gather around the board placed in the center of the table.

THE BOARD is divided into four divisions: Entertainment, Speculation, Love Affairs and Social Life; each having a different color. Each division is divided into four parts. The three plain sections, with illustrations of various articles, are called sections. The shaded section of each division bearing the three link design are called "Super-Sections."

TO BEGIN: Each player places a Stooge on any plain section in any division.

STOOGE The purpose of the Stooge is to aid the Brewster in spending his fortune. Each time the Diary Chart directs a payment to the Banker, the amount specified is multiplied by the number of the player's Stooges in that division; so the more Stooges a player has, the faster his fortune is spent. A player may have only one of his Stooges on a Section. If directed to place a Stooge on a Section already occupied by one of his own Stooges, he loses his play. When a player places a Stooge on a Section with other player's Stooges, he receives \$10,000 from each of the players who have Stooges in that Section. Stooges are only played in Sections. They are not allowed in Super-Sections.

THE FIRST PLAYER is the BANKER, who SPINS the

RAINBOW WHEEL This always spun at the beginning of each player's turn. When the indicator comes to rest on a

SYMBOL such as High Hat, Dice or Bell, the player puts a Stooge on that section of the board corresponding with the symbol. The entertainment division has the same Symbol on all three sections. This allows the player to place his Stooge in any Section he desires when this Symbol is spun.

BLACK SQUARE means player pays \$10,000 wages for each Stooge he has on the board. This is paid to the BANKER. He then spins the DIARY WHEEL.

BLACK CIRCLE gives the player a spin of the

DIARY WHEEL Before the Diary Wheel is spun, player indicates to all other Brewsters which one of the four divisions he wishes to play. He usually selects the division where most of his Stooges are located because his spending is multiplied by the number of Stooges he has. The number spun refers the player to the

DIARY CHARTS These are of four kinds corresponding to the four divisions on the SPENDING BOARD. One side of each chart bears directions for ladies, the other for gentlemen. The player selects the Diary Card corresponding to his chosen division and refers to the number as spun on the Diary Wheel. He reads aloud the Diary entry and then pays to or receives from the Banker the amount specified, times the number of Stooges he has in this division. He then has the privilege of playing Stooges as further directed on the Diary Chart. The directions so far give all the details of play. THE SECOND PLAYER The Brewster at the left of the first player now takes his turn and the play continues around the board to the left, each player starting by spinning the Rainbow Wheel.

SUPER-STOOGES equal three Stooges. They are placed only on the Super-Sections of a division. To gain a Super-Stooge, a player must have one of his Stooges on each of the three sections of a division. He then sweeps the Stooges of all other players, including his own, from the Plain Section of that division and places a Super-Stooge on the Super-Section of that division. All players may have as many Super-Stooges as desired in any Super-Section. No fee is paid for making a Super-Stooge. Super-Stooges are never removed from the board during the game. They may be moved from one Super-Section to another only when the Diary directs. When a Super-Stooge is created, players repeat the process of placing Stooges on the cleared sections. When making or receiving a payment, a Super-Stooge counts the same value as three regular Stooges.

DIARY MOVES When the Diary directs a player to

SWAP, he is allowed the privilege of Swapping or changing the position of any of his Stooges or Super-Stooges with any other player's Stooges or Super-Stooges.

PAY STOOGES WAGES Player counts all the Stooges he has on the Board and multiplies the number by \$10,000 which is the wage of each Stooge.

"PAY TO THE BANKER" Player multiplies the amount to be paid to the Bank by the number of Stooges he has in that division.

"RECEIVE FROM THE BANK" Player multiplies the amount to be received from the Bank by the number of Stooges he has in that division.

TO WIN THE GAME A player must spend his entire fortune of \$1,000,000 plus any additional money he may pick up during the play.

If players wish, they may address one another during the game as "Brewster".

THE GAME FOR FIVE TO EIGHT PLAYERS When more than four Brewsters play, each player uses only one style of Stooge. When one of his Stooges is placed on a Super-Stooge section it becomes a Super-Stooge, and is so played. Instead of using the Brewster Money, all players keep a record of their money with pencil and pad. Each player will write down the figure \$1,000,000 and subtract or add to this amount as the play progresses until one player has spent his million.
