# What Do

Are you a prodigy — or a master mind? Perhaps you are even a genius and never realized it. You will soon know after you play this game.

Everyone starts at the bottom of the board, with the status of a "moron," but by correctly answering the questions asked, you advance step by step through various stages of intelligence until someone reaches the status of a "genius"—which is the goal of the game.

As the title indicates, what you know plays a most important part in your advancement. However, there are several elements of luck, such as landing on a circle whose color corresponds to that of your token, and landing on a "lucky star."

#### RULES

(For from two to four players)

#### EQUIPMENT:

The equipment consists of the board, with rows of colored circles denoting various stages of intelligence. There are two dice, four colored tokens, and a book of questions and answers.

#### TO START THE GAME:

Each player throws one of the dice to determine his starting position. If a "6" is rolled, the player starts on the sixth circle from the left, on the bottom row - if a "5" is rolled he would start on the fifth circle from the left, etc. After the starting positions have been attained, the one at the least advanced circle then rolls both the dice for the purpose of determining the question to be asked. Turns then follow to the left. If, for instance, this player should roll "8," he would be asked question number 8 on the first page of questions, and if the next player should roll a "5" he would be asked question number 5 on the second page of questions, and so on, the one asking the questions turning to the next page after each question is answered. When a question is answered 100% correctly the player advances 7 circles, otherwise he goes back 2 circles. The movement is always from left to right; that is, when a player reaches the circle at the extreme right on the bottom row, he next advances to the circle at the extreme left of the 2nd row, etc.

#### THE QUESTIONS:

One of the players holds the book of questions and asks the questions of the others. When it is his turn he hands the book of questions to another player who will ask him a question and then return the book.

#### PROMPTING:

At the beginning of the game, players should be cautioned against prompting or hinting, as anyone guilty of this offense will be penalized 3 circles.

## LANDING ON AN OCCUPIED CIRCLE:

If in advancing or going back, you land on a circle already occupied, continue in the direction in which you are going to the first unoccupied circle.

## WHEN CIRCLE MATCHES TOKEN:

If in advancing or going back, you should land on a circle whose color is the same as the color of your token, you immediately get an extra turn. This rule does not hold true when advancing from a "Lucky Star"—see below.

## LANDING ON A "LUCKY STAR":

If in advancing or going back, you are fortunate enough to land on a star, you immediately advance to the circle directly above the star landed upon. If the circle you advance to happens to be the same color as your token, you do not get an extra turn as you ordinarily would.

## LAST 5 BLACK CIRCLES:

On the last five (black) circles the movement forward will be reduced to r instead of the usual 7, while the backward movement will remain at the usual 2.
