THE GAME OF

## "The House that Jack Built."

Published by PARKER BROTHERS, Salem, Mass., U. S. A.

1. There are in this game a number of pairs, each pair having the same picture and therefore matching, and one card with the picture of "Jack."

- 2. THE OBJECT OF THE GAME is to see which player will retain "Jack," after all the cards are matched.
- 3. Shuffle the cards and deal one at a time until all are distributed.
- 4. As soon as the cards are dealt, each player matches as many of the cards in his hand as he can and throws them aside, that is, if he holds any pairs he puts them down.
- 5. The dealer then draws a card from the player on his right, and if it matches and forms a pair with one of the cards in his hand, he throws the pair

aside. If it does not match, he keeps it in his hand.

- 6. Whether he can match the card drawn or not, it then becomes the turn of the player on his left to draw from him, and match if possible.
- 7. So the game proceeds until all the cards have been matched and thrown aside, LEAVING JACK ONLY, and the player holding that is declared the WINNER.
- 8. When a player has matched all his cards, he is out of the game, and must draw no more.
