

# Honeycomb Kid's COWBOYS and INDIANS "SHOOT OUT."

1. The object of the game is to shoot all of your opponent's targets before he shoots yours.

2. To set up game: Arrange the battlefields so they are opposite each other. Then use the clips to attach the instruction cards to the backs of each battlefield so neither player can see the other's battlefield.

3. Each player arranges his 6 Cowboy (or Indian) targets on one half of his battlefield in any manner he wishes. The other half of the battlefield is used for shooting bullets.

4. Flip a coin to decide who starts the shoot out.

5. To start the shoot out: Take a bullet the same color as your own targets, and place it in the half



of your battlefield where you have no targets stationed. Tell your opponent the bullet's position—such as A-6.

Your opponent then checks to see if one of his targets covers the A-6 position on his battlefield. If not, he tells you that you have "missed." You leave your bullet where it is to remind you that this is an empty space on your opponent's battlefield. If he does have a target covering his A-6 position, he tells you that you have made a "hit." You then remove your bullet and replace it with one the same color as your opponent's targets. This is how you score your "hits."

Your opponent then takes his turn and shoots a bullet at your targets.

6. There is one exception to the above rules—the Cactus target. If you hit the Cactus, you have made a "wild shot." You do not score this as a hit, and your opponent then

takes 3 shots in a row—his normal turn plus 2 free shots.

- 7. The game continues in this manner until one player wins by accumulating 16 "hits"—the number of hits required to completely shoot down each of his opponent's 5 military targets. Remember that the Cactus is not a military target—hitting it is a "wild shot," which is not scored as a "hit."
- 8. When a player says he has won, the instruction cards are removed. The bullets and targets on both battlefields are checked to verify the victory.
