On opposite side of this sheet are sixty slips, which must first be cut apart at the dotted lines. Then play the game as follows:

Directions for Playing

Choose a director who shall hold this list of questions (on other side) and distribute the slips among the players. Each player shall also hold a number of forfeits (about 6 apiece), matches or Lion Coffee beans being the best. The Director then reads aloud the questions, stopping after each question to await the answer. The player who holds the answer should, of course, be the first to respond, but if another player answers the question first, he receives a forfeit from the person who should have answered. If no one answers it, the Director then reads the answer and claims the forfeit. When the questions are all answered, the person who holds the most forfeits has won the game. It is best for the Director to skip around in asking the questions, and sometimes repeat the same question a short time after first reading it, since this enlivens the game and prevents the players from using the numbers on their slips.
